Here we learn how Bollington life compares to life in villages abroad, as two local residents deatail their time in Africa. Up first: Barbara Challenger in Kenya and Ghana.

Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO): Definately worth it!

Going overseas to work as a volunteer wasn't something I always wanted to do.

Retiring early from a job in education, I worked at a garden centre which I loved. Soon, I thought I needed another challenge. I felt I could still use my experience in education management and I also wanted to travel, so that's when I considered voluntary service overseas (VSO).

It took 18 months to go through VSO's selection and training process, while also addressing my own anxieties before I took up my first placement in Nairobi, Kenya in 2010.

As 'Education Management

Advisor 1 worked for the Kenyan Government in the Special Needs Education Section of the Education Service offering advice on implementing policy and strategy in Special Education Needs (SEN). I was office-bound, so sadly didn't get to visit many schools.

I helped develop a plan to make schools aware of the newly produced SEN policy which had taken 10 years to develop. Although there was a policy for SEN, there was little money to implement it and Children with SEN and disabilities struggled to survive in developing countries let alone achieve their right to education. Culturally, some people still viewed children with disabilities as a curse and some are left to die. Accurate statistics on children with SEN and disabilities aren't available and provision for them is often non-existent and their needs are overlooked.

months in Accra, Chana in 2012.

This time my placement was in a

Non-Government Organisation: Chana National Education Campaign Coalition. As Policy Simplification and Communication Officer¹, worked with a small group whose aim was to put pressure on the Government to improve education for Chanalan children. Chana has so many education problems including: insofficient

schools, a lack of trained teachers, girls' education, poor quality teaching, weak management, large classes, few resources and appalling toilet provision, so it's difficult to know where to start.

I worked on many tasks at CNECC including research and cataloguing Chanalan education policies which aim to help children attend school and improve the quality of their education. Ghana has endless

policies but limited ability to implement them well.

In addition to work which I found rewarding, the experiences I had whilst doing VSO were not all comfortable and life was, often, tough. My first 'home' in Kenya was squalid, spartan, infested with cockroaches and flooded when it rained and I moved 4 times in 6 months.

Public transport was a nightmare due to congestion clapped-out out to the congestion of lapped-out vehicles and cazy drives, and the Chamaian heat was unrelenting. Chamaian heat was unrelenting at a tap, no baths and water and power shortages were frequent. I was scammed and robbed on two separate occasions. I saw extreme powerly in the sums, justaposed with the extreme wealth of communities which had palsatio houses with guards, servants and swimming noots.

Conversely, I made new friends, learned a lot and tested my own strength of character lexperienced different cultures, customs, ways of working and floods. I visited game reserves in Kenya, including Massi Mara and Amboseli, and spent a week on the Island of Lamu on the south coast where the transport is by donkey I saw places that moved me to tears, most notably Cape Coast Casled with its roots in the

The experiences made me view the world from a broader perspective. Returning to the UK after living

in Africa did prove a shock to the system in reverse. I was far more appreciative of the services and material lounders I have in Bollington - my house, car, constant power, drinking water from a top and uninterrupted wifi. We're so fortunate to have a library, medical centre, schools, arts and other social amenities on our doorstep. There is a tendency to take so much for exarted living here.

I will feel eternally grateful to VSO for enabling me to live and work, share knowledge and experiences in Kenya and Chana.

THE FASCINATING STORIES OF TWO BOLLINGTON RESIDENTS ABROAD.

Next we move to Rwanda with Margaret Park...

Leaving Bollington and boarding the plane for Rwanda was a huge challenge. I was going far away to an unfamiliar life, leaving behind everyone I knew and loved. But it was the challenge I had chosen. I was drawn to the vibrancy of Africa.

As a teacher who moved to Bollington six years ago, I had wanted to stay in education. With an interest in world cultures and international development, realised my skills and experience could be utilised overseas, International development charity, Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO), looks for volunteers whose professional experience can be of value in developing countries. After a thorough interview process, I was offered a placement in Rwanda to work alongside teachers in primary schools.

Ny village home in Musambira sometimes had running water and electricity, but not always. Hens, gosts and children roamed close by, whilst the adults were more reserva and it took time for them to accept me. By visiting local schools, buying essentials at the timy village shops and mingling in the weekly market, the community and I gradually got to know each other.

In the weeks before beginning my work, I spent time with established VSO volunteers to understand 'the way things are' in Rwanda. At the same time, I began to learn the local language, Kinyawanda, because I needed to be able to chat to am neighbours and fellow "Villagers" Villagers in Rwanda was similar in many ways to Bollington – it was such a surprise to see the daily activities and community needs of Wussmifter ammored those of home.

My placement involved hours of travelling to schools in the district, usually on the back of a motorbike. Even in dry weather, pot-holed, redearth roads or tracks made travel difficult. With over 2,500 primary schools in a country the size of Wales, most are located in rural areas of a green, mountainous and

very beautiful country. Despite the risks of travel the far reaching views over rolling, hills and scenes from village. If we were well worth it. For Rwandan children, walking long distances are not insurmountable problems, as they and their families understand the importance of education.

Children usually have smiles on their faces as they link arms with friends and skip along to school. Meeting and interacting with these children and their teachers was one of the most rewarding parts of my placement.

Since the genocide in 1994, when over 10% of the population were slaughtered, including many of Rwands's teachers, school enrolment has increased to almost 100%. Now the government's concerns are about the quality of education. Teaching conditions are very different from what we know here in the UK. Class sizes are huge learning materials like visual aids, counting equipment and textbooks are available, they are rarely used.

Learner-centred methods, which enable all pupils, including those with disabilities, be part of their own learning are being encouraged,

Volunteering has given me a new appreciation for what I have back home and has been one of the most rewarding things I've done. New I'm back in Boilington and have ald time to reflect, I think I may have learned more from the Rwandians than they did from me. I love living in Boilington, but I left a part of me in Rwandia. FARMHOUSE HISTORY... PART ONE

What did the Normans ever do for the people of Bollington? It turns out that the answer is that they destroyed most of their homes soon after 1066, when they carried out the famous "harrying of the North".

As a result the whole area where we live now was described as "waste" in the Doomsday Book.



by the Lord of Bollinston, Robert de Legh, who had been granted the manor by the Black Prince (the son of King Edward III). He was awarded in 1380 the lease of "part of the town of Bollington with a water-mill there, for twelve years, at 8 marks per annum." It was at this time that court records show the Legh family were active as stewards of the Royal Forest, If any local people were caught poaching when "taking a doe" they could be hanged on the soot. The oldest part of Bollington Hall Farm was probably built by Robert's greatgrandson, Thomas Legh.

centre of ancient Bollington and nearby, beside the River Dean, was a com mill. This mill needed

to be regained in 1354, during a visit to Macclesfield by the Prince himself, and he approved the use of timber from the forest to repair it. This mill was in use

until the early 20th century when the lest which powered blocked and the mill fell into a ruinous



The Hall and its mill are not mentioned in the records again until the 19th century, when it was all put up for sale by auction in 1874, as advertised in the Manchester Guardian. Mark Stedman


Bollington Library will host a Book signing from 2-4pm on Friday November 7th featuring Bollington Author Jenny Martin.

The White Nancy Boys are now an established mountain bike group that meet and ride from Bollington, and while it may now be common place to see cyclists around the village, biking wasn't always as prevalent. The group soon grew in numbers with local bikers joining with some from as far afield as Stockport and Manchester. Current membership stands at around thirty.

A usual weekly schedule will consist of a Sunday moming ride leavening from the Turners Arms at around p0,00m. The group also ride on Thursday evenings and this popular event usually ends up in the Poachers Inn or the Viceroy curry house.

With the advent of trail centers in various parts of the UK, the group travel to Llandegla or Penmachmo in Wales, probably once every 6 weeks or so. Both these centres provide good technical trails for all levels of rider. Llandegla is aparticular favourite, providing well groomed trails and a superb après ride cafe.

Every year some of the group pack up their bikes and hit the trails of Spain, namely to Fuengirola where Sierra Cycling entertains with a variety of adrenaline-filled rides, not to mention the nightlife which all enjoy, possibly too much.

The group has an annual trip to Scotland which usually takes place in September. The accommodation at the Peebles Hydro links nicely with Clentress and Innerleithen trail centres.

The boys also host downhill days which take place in and around the Peaks. These are pretty unique and take a lot of organizing but the enjoyment and end result is superb for all involved.

Our Christmas celebrations usually take the form of a day out in Manchester tasting the local beers, wines and spirits followed by a meal

Over the years the focus of the group has changed to suit some of the newer members and as younger, faster riders have joined, the old ethos of stopping and taking in the beautiful scenery that surround the bikers has diminished somewhat, while the emphasis on speed has taken over.

In essence there are now two subgroups, one fast and one not so fast, so that when you join, you will get a choice of who to ride with. Whichever sub-group you choose, you all come together afterwards.

The social aspect of the group brings everyone together with various functions throughout the year such as the Druids Summer Solstice ride, Halloween night, where fancy dress in encouraged, and ride to Rainow, to sayour the beer at the Robin

Wherever the destination you can usually find them back in the Poschers or the Vicerory to celebrate, so if riding fast or slow, touring the trails or if a good social get-together appeals to you, then get in touch and you too can be a "White Nancy Box." Geoff Coe "White Nancy Box."
